CONFERENCE THEME

Cues of Addiction: Brain Pathways of Self-Control vs. Compulsion

Drug addiction, including addiction to tobacco, entails a loss of voluntary control over behavior. In recent years there has been a burgeoning of knowledge about brain mechanisms that mediate self-control and, at the opposite end of the spectrum, compulsion. In addition, studies have used neuroimaging methods to assess brain responses to cues associated with drug use that can elicit compulsive behavior and derail attempts to remain abstinent. This conference brings together researchers who have been studying neurobehavioral mechanisms of self-control and compulsive drug use. Behavioral, imaging and neuropharmacologic approaches will be synthesized in the presentations and discussions. The goal will be to provide an up-to-date summary of knowledge in this field and generate ideas for further synthesis and progress in both the understanding and treatment of drug addictions.

The program is co-sponsored by the North Carolina Psychological Association (NCPA) and the Duke Center for Nicotine & Smoking Cessation Research (CNSCR). The NCPA is approved by the American Psychological Association (APA) to sponsor continuing education for psychologists. The NCPA maintains responsibility for this program and its content. This program is offered for 6 hours of continuing education credit.
